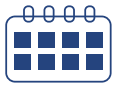

How to get to the City



By Air

Turin-Caselle Airport (TRN) is the city's main international airport, located about 16 km northwest of the city center. It offers both national and international flights and is well connected to the city via trains, buses, and taxis.



By Rail

Porta Susa is the closest station to the conference venue, it is a key railway station in Turin, offering national and international connections.



By Bus and Metro

Buses: Turin is well-served by a network of public buses that connect all parts of the city and surrounding areas. Main stops are at the train stations (Porta Nuova and Porta Susa), the city center, and residential areas.

Metro: Turin's metro system is quick and convenient, with several stops in both the city center and suburban areas.

Bus to the Airport: The "Airbus" service directly connects Turin-Caselle Airport to Porta Nuova and Porta Susa stations, providing a convenient way to get into the city.



By Car

Turin is easily accessible by car from various regions of Italy via the main highways. From the A4 highway, which connects Milan to Turin, you can drive directly into the city, with the journey taking approximately 1.5 hours. If you're coming from Bologna or Florence, the A21 highway is the best route, leading directly to Turin in about 3 hours.

How to get to the venue

The Intesa Sanpaolo Tower (Grattacielo Intesa Sanpaolo) is located in the Centro Direzionale Lingotto area in Turin, Italy. The tower is easily accessible from the city center.



How to get the venue from Torino Porta Susa Station:

The Intesa Sanpaolo Tower is within walking distance from Torino Porta Susa station, and it takes about 5 minutes to reach it on foot.
